## DISTRESSING CITY TRACEDY.

## Inquest and Verdict.

An inquest was held at Barrington's Hospital yesterday by Mr J. S. McNeice, City Coroner, and a jury into the circumstances connected with the death of Patrick O'Dwyer, plumber, No. 4 O'Curry Place, in the institution on Sunday night.

Juspector McCarron conducted the enquiry.

Bridget O'Dwyer, wife of the deceased, stated that her husband was 46 years of age, and had been suffering from rheumatism during the past two years, which prevented him working. He returned home on Sunday at \$ o'clock, and went to his room. She was temporary absent from the house for a time, and on returning she went into his room, and asked him how he felt, and he replied that he would be alright only for the pain in Sometime later she went into the room again and saw him lying on the bed evidently in distress. She summoned her brother, who lived in the house with her, and when he arrived he had the Civic Guards summoned.

Dr J. Roberts stated that death was due to shock and hamorrhage, due to an incised wound in the throat.

Patrick Kirby, brother-in-law of the deceased, who identified the body, stated when he entered his bedroom he found him lying on the bed. There was a wound in the threat from which blood was flowing, but he found no instrument that would be likely to cause the injury. He sent for the Civic Guards, and had the ambulance requisitioned. He was aware that deceased had been in ill health during the past two years.

The evidence of Sergeant O'Mahony, O'Curry street station, was to the effect that when he arrived at the deceased's house he entered his room and found O'Dwyer lying on the bed. There was an extensive would in the throat, and blood on the bed clothing. He found a blood stained razor a short distance from the body. The man was then alive, but breathing heavily, and he was removed to Barrington's Hospital where he died sometime after ten o'clock.
