DEATH OF MR J J MacMAHON, M.P.S.I.

We regret to announce the death of Mr John J. MacMahon, M.P.S.I., which occurred in St. John's Hospital on Tuesday night and removes from the city a well-known and highly respected business man. Mr MacMahon, who had reached his sixty-fifth year, had been seriously ill for some time. He was the eldest son of the late Mr and Mrs Andrew MacMahon, of Jail street, Ennis, where he served his apprenticeship to the chemistry business. He then went to Dublin, where he was admitted to membership of the Pharmaceutical Society of Ireland. After spending some years in the capital, he was appointed manager of the Dispensing and Drug Department of the firm of J. P. Evans & Co., O'Connell street, and subsequently was elected apothecary of the Limerick Union Workhouse, a position that he held down to the time of his death under the new regime. Some twenty years ago Mr MacMahon opened business in William Street, where he built up a successful trade connection. He was very popular, socially, and in business. He was a nephew of the late Mr John McInerney, J.P., Chairman of the old Limerick Board of Guardians, and brother-in-law of Mr Jack McAulay, ex-international Rugby player. His death, as stated, is sincerely regretted, and the sympathy of the citizens is extended to his widow and family in their sorrow.

The funeral which took place this afternoon from St Munchin's Catholic Church to Mount St Laurence Cemetery was very large and representative.

At the meeting of the Corporation Improvement Committee last night, Mr P. Bourke moved that the sympathy of the Committee be given to the widow and family of the deceased. The Mayor having associated himself with the remarks of Mr Bourke, the resolution was passed in silence.
