Ports in Belfast.

Belfast Harbour Commissioners have decided unanimously to reduce the rates on reductions in the existing schedule. In the case of vessels from the North Channel a reduction is to be 7½ per cent. from January 1st last, and in the case of vessels from the Channel and coastwise a reduction is to be 15 per cent. from January 1st last. A complete schedule of rates is to be prepared and submitted to the Board.
