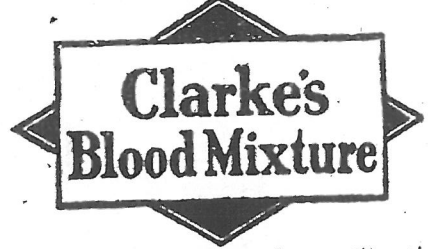

**U.S. BLIZZARDS.**

**Rains Welcomed in Drought Areas**

Chicago, Sunday.—Blinding snowstorms, screaming winds, and abundant rains have finally answered the prayers all over the country for relief from drought, and although a considerable amount of damage has been done, and traffic has been crippled, and many towns have been rendered snow-bound, virtually the entire Middle West grain belt has been relieved by the moisture, which means millions to farmers, while the owners of cotton plantations are simply jubilant.

Chicago is one of the stormiest centres. Lake Michigan has been whipped up into fury by the gale, and the waves have been bounding over the Boulevards, which have become so slippery with frozen spray that they had to be closed at some points, while the snow is piling up every hour.—Reuter.

New York, Sunday.—Two persons were killed and more than twenty have been taken to hospital injured as the result of storms and floods in Brooklyn, where much damage to property has been done. The deaths were caused by a motor car collision in the blinding gale, while the injuries were due to falling street signs and chimneys and to broken windows.

Terrific waves on the New Jersey water front have caused more than a million dollars of damage to property, while flooded meadows are delaying railway and road traffic between New York and Newark.—Ex. Tel. Co.
