## DEATH OF REV WALTER BAXENDALE

The "Norwood Press" records the death on the 28th ult. at Casewick Road, West Norwood, of the Rev Walter Baxendale at the ripe age of 87. Many of the older generation in Limerick will remember Mr Baxendale as Pastor of the Congregational Chapel in this city, with which he was connected for seven years, and was very popular with all classes and creeds. He returned to England in 1891, having accepted the pastorate of the Congregational Church in Chapel Road, West Norwood, and in 1904 he retired on pension. As our contemporary points out he was an accomplished Greek and Hebrew scholar, and a poet of no mean standard. He took a great interest in political and local affairs, and in the famous Midlothian campaign supported Mr Gladstone by speaking throughout the country in favour of his first Irish Home Rule Bill. He was a keen cricketer in his young days, and often played with Dr W. G. Grace. He leaves two sons and five daughters to mourn his loss.
