ABUSIVE LANGUAGE.

Patrick Lynch, Waller's Well, summoned Sarah Mullins for abusive language. A boy named Joseph Mullins, son of the defendant, summoned Lynch for assault.

Patrick Lynch stated that he found the three boys trespassing on his property and interfering with his roost. The son of the defendant was one of the boys, but he did not allege that the boy stole any of the eggs. Mrs Mullins called on him later and used most abusive language.

In the assault case brought by the boy, it was alleged Lynch ducked him twice in a stream.

The Justice said that in view of the good characters of the parties he would dismiss the summonses, but Mrs Mullins would have to give an undertaking not to interfere with Lynch again.

BOY STRUCK BY MOTOR LORRY.

Fatal Result.

Terence Mulqueen, aged eight years, was knocked down by a motor lorry on the Cork road on Thursday night, and succumbed to his injuries an hour after admission to the County Infirmary.

It was stated that the boy, who resided with his parents, Mr J. Mulqueen (late Irish Guards) and Mrs Mulqueen, Bengal Terrace, was at the time of the occurrence crossing the road. He was rendered unconscious, and evidently suffering from grave injuries when picked up. At the Infirmary everything possible was done for him, but he passed away, as stated.

Sometime later the driver of the lorry, which belongs to the country, was arrested by Sergeant Higgins, and charged with the manslaughter of the boy. He was taken before a Peace Commissioner and remanded on bails to the next Liberties Court, to be held on the 13th May.

Yesterday Mr J. S. McNeice, City Coroner, and a jury, opened an inquest on the body of the deceased boy, and after taking evidence of identification and medical testimony, the enquiry was adjourned.
