**PRESIDENT COSGRAVE IN  
 CORK.**

President Cosgrave visited the Bishops of  
 Cork during some busy hours he spent in  
 the city yesterday.

At night he spoke to a large meeting in  
 the Father Matthew Hall. In his speech,  
 President Cosgrave showed the fallacy of  
 many of the proposals put forward by op-  
 ponents of the Government, especially those  
 regarding land annuities and an extended  
 scheme of tariffs. While he admitted that  
 the Budget would provide for the assistance  
 of the farming community, he declined to  
 state the nature of the Government's pro-  
 posals, adding that such measures as they  
 could take would be effective only to the  
 extent to which the reliefs provided are  
 accepted and utilised by the farmer as an  
 encouragement to further production.
