CITY TRAGEDY.

LORRY ACCIDENT.

Two Men Dead.

Some short time after 9 o'clock last night an accident, attended with fatal results, occurred at Corbally. A motor lorry, carrying a heavy bulk of timber, the property of Mr Ryan, Nicholas street, was proceeding from Clare into the city. Two young men named Michael Liddane, Ballysimon, a carpenter, and James Wall, a plasterer, a native of Bodyke, but residing in the city, were in the lorry at the time, having availed of a lift returning from their work to the city. When the vehicle reached the railway bridge and was getting from the main thoroughfare into Park road it suddenly jolted, with the result that the timber was dislodged and both men thrown heavily on to the road. In the fall Liddane was killed, and Wall received grave injuries to both legs, and other parts of the body, caused by being jammed by the timber. The Rev Father O'Connor, C.C., St. Mary's, and Rev Father Halpin, C.C., St. Patrick's, were quickly on the scene, and administered the rites of the Church just as the Fire Brigade Ambulance came along.

Wall was removed in the ambulance to Barrington's Hospital in a serious condition and succumbed to his injuries some time before midnight. The body of Liddane was taken to the County Infirmary Morgue pending an inquest.
