In the Dail yesterday, Mr Burke, Parliamentary Secretary (for the Minister for Industry and Commerce), said there was no intention of holding an inquiry into the question of the Shannon fisheries. The E.S.B. in operating the Shannon works would, as far as was consistent with the maintenance of the power supply, take steps to minimise flooding, but the Minister had no functions which could lead to the holding of an inquiry into such a matter.
