## PROSECUTION AT CASTLE WEST. SAD HURLING FATALITY IN CO. LIMERICK.

### Struck by a Ball.

West District Court on  
Kenny, B.L., D.J.,  
proprietor, Newcastle  
charged for a breach of the  
Martin prosecuted, and  
attorney, Newcastle West,

deposed that on Thurs-  
day he was on duty at  
12 o'clock when his atten-  
tion was attracted to the  
defendant's premises  
below the bar. He  
went to the door of the premises,  
and asked who was  
there. The girl, however, did not  
answer, and he went back into the  
bar. Three minutes afterwards  
he was in charge of the bar,  
and admitted witness.  
Witness said there were no  
other persons, except a few men in  
the bar. On an examination  
however, witness found three  
persons at a table in a room next  
to the bar. Witness asked them  
to account for their presence.  
Witness said they were  
three men, witness added,  
and they were under the influence  
of alcohol. Witness said that  
he had been on the premises visited  
at all times, and that nearly every  
one who came in were friends of  
the defendant. Witness said

At Broadford, County Limerick, on Sun-  
day afternoon, as a result of an accident, a  
man named John Horan, aged 36 years, a  
native of Templeglantine, was fatally in-  
jured.

A hurling contest between Moneygay and  
Templeglantine was timed to start about  
3.30, and when the teams had taken the  
field there was the usual puck about of the  
ball by individual players of both teams.  
One of the Templeglantine players, named  
Rennix, net a drop puck out with his  
hurley, and Horan, who was standing about  
20 yards away, failed to see the ball coming,  
and got struck behind the right ear. He  
collapsed, and became unconscious.

The Sergeant of the Dromcollogher Guards  
who was present, tried artificial respiration  
without result. A priest and doctor were  
then summoned, and the ambulance from  
Croom sent for, but the unfortunate man  
died shortly after.

The accident was witnessed by the de-  
ceased's father. Horan was a married man,  
and leaves a wife and six children.

The Coroner did not consider an inquest  
necessary.

The funeral, which took place yesterday,  
was very largely attended by the members  
of the Gaelic Athletic Association in West  
Limerick.
