The death, which we announce with regret, took place at the residence of a relative in Abbeydorney, Co. Kerry, this morning of Mr Thomas S. Lawler, a wellknown native of this city. The deceased, who had attained his fifty-third year, had been ailing for some time. He was son of the late Mr M. O'H. Lawler, and brother of MrJoseph Lawler, of the firm of Messrs. Shekleton and Lawler, merchant tailors, O'Connell-street. The late Mr Lawler was for a number of years on the clerical staff of the Condensed Milk Co. of Ireland while owned by Messrs.
