## DEATH OF MR T. S. LAWLER, EX-HIGH SHERIFF.

The death, which we announce with  
 regret, took place at the residence of a  
 relative in Abbeydorney, Co. Kerry, this  
 morning of Mr Thomas S. Lawler, a well-  
 known native of this city. The deceased,  
 who had attained his fifty-third year, had  
 been ailing for some time. He was son of  
 the late Mr M. O'H. Lawler, and brother of  
 Mr Joseph Lawler, of the firm of Messrs.  
 Shekleton and Lawler, merchant tailors,  
 O'Connell-street. The late Mr Lawler was  
 for a number of years on the clerical staff  
 of the Condensed Milk Co. of Ireland while  
 owned by Messrs. Cleeve Bros., and sub-  
 sequently went into business for himself  
 before leaving to reside in Dublin.  
 He was co-opted a member of the  
 Limerick Borough Council in September,  
 1915, and was City High Sheriff two years,  
 an office he discharged with ability and  
 dignity. He was an ardent supporter of the  
 Irish Parliamentary Party, and a close  
 personal friend of several members of that  
 school of political thought. A fluent  
 speaker, particularly at social functions, the  
 deceased was held in the utmost respect  
 in his native city, where his death will be  
 learned with sincere regret, and sympathy  
 given to his widow and brother in their  
 bereavement.
