CITY FATALITY.

School Girl Drowned.

A school girl named Josephine O'Brien, aged 12 years, was drowned in the mill race at Corbally last night in twelve feet of water. With a companion named Mary Collins, aged 14 years, she went to play near the water and then attempted to cross a narrow plank projecting over the mill race. In doing so she lost her balance, toppled in and disappeared. Her companion ran for help, but it was too late when it arrived. The body was recovered an hour later by Mr D. Ievers, an employe of the Lax Weir Fishing Company. The deceased lived with her widowed mother, who is employed at Corbally House.

Mr. J. S. McNeice, City Coroner, held an inquest without a jury on the body, when the evidence showed that the girl accidentally slipped off the plank and fell into the water.

The medical testimony was that death was due to asphyxia, caused by drowning, and the Coroner recorded a verdict of death by accidental drowning.
