## ESTATE OF MR FRANCIS J B GUBBINS.

Mr Francis Joseph Beresford Gubbins,  
J.P., of Kilfrush, Knocklong, Co. Limerick,  
formerly Deputy Lieutenant for the County  
of Limerick, a well-known breeder of  
pedigree cattle, who died on November 10th  
last, left unsettled personal property in  
England and the Irish Free State, valued at  
£122,671. Probate has been granted to his  
widow, Mrs Katherine Gubbins, of Kilfrush.  
His brother, Lieut Fredric William  
Beresford Gubbins, R.E., of Swalecliff Park,  
Banbury, and Henry Pelman Mayne, of 6  
Dawson Street, Dublin, solicitor.

The testator left £100 to his steward,  
William Thorp, if in his employ at his  
death; £200 to his gardener, Fredrick  
Hopkinson, if in his employ at his death;  
£160 a year to Eleanor Cecil Cox, companion  
to his late wife; £500 to Henry Pelman  
Mayne; £160 per annum to Janet Henderson  
Graham; funds over which he had power of  
appointment under his father's will upon  
trust for his wife and the children of such  
marriage, and the residue of the property in  
trust for his wife for life, with remainder to  
his children as his wife may appoint, or  
failing appointment, to his children or their  
issue in equal shares, or, failing issue, as to  
one-half in trust to his nephew, Thomas S.  
Beresford Gubbins and his issue, and one-  
half in trust for his nephew, Roderick  
Joseph Beresford Gubbins and his issue.

## DEATH OF THE REV. P. BUTLER.

The Rev. P. Butler, C.C., St. Audoen's,  
High street, Dublin, died yesterday in a  
Dublin private hospital after a short illness.  
Father Butler, who was 56 years of age, was  
a nephew of the late Very Rev William  
Mulcahy, P.P., Croagh, and brother of Mr  
John Butler, Ballyneety, County Limerick.  
His student days were spent at the Sacred  
Heart College, Limerick; at Clonliffe College,  
and at Maynooth, where he was ordained in  
1902. After holding curacies at Barnderrig,  
County Wicklow, and Porterstown, County  
Dublin, he was appointed to High street,  
Dublin, where for twenty years he gave un-  
grudging work amongst the poor. He was  
noted for his geniality, and was very popular  
amongst his fellow-priests.
