SHANNON BATHING FATALITY.

City Youth Drowned.

A distressing bathing tragedy occurred in the Shannon to-day, the victim being a young lad named Thomas Hourigan, aged seventeen years, of the Island Road. It appears that with some companions he was after swimming across the river near the Railway Bridge at Longpavement, and was returning when he got into difficulties caused by the strong receding tide, and before any of his companions could reach him to render help he was taken down and disappeared. Some twenty minutes later the body was recovered and taken here in a boat. Civic Guards from Mary street, who were quickly on the scene, applied first aid methods but without avail, and the remains were subsequently removed in the Fire Station ambulance to Barrington's Hospital, where an inquest is to be held this evening by Mr J. S. McNeice, City Coroner.

DANCERS' THRILLING EXPERIENCE.

Trapped on Blazing Pier.

Rescued by Boats.

Some eight hundred people, mostly women and girls, att nding a gala on Penarth Pier last night had to flee for their lives when fire broke out in the pavilion in which the dance was being held.

The pavilion was at the sea end of the seven hundred-foot long pier, and though some escaped by a mad dash to the shoreward end, many were trapped on the pierhead.

A raging sea was running at the time, and, but for the promptitude of members of the local yacht club, who launched boats, the dancers would almost certainly have been drowned had they escaped the flames.

One of the rescuing boats capsized when being launched from the shore, and the occupants had to swim ashore.
