FATAL ACCIDENT.

An inquest was held at Barrington's
 Hospital on Thursday evening touching the
 death of Patrick O'Sullivan, 42 years, un-
 married, residing in Watergate, who died on
 the previous day from injuries sustained
 while engaged as a mason's labourer at the
 Good Shepherd Convent. He was in the
 employment of Messrs John Ryan and
 Sons, Thomas street. It appears that a
 fourteen foot ladder on which he was en-
 gaged, slipped throwing deceased to the
 ground, and he died subsequently from the
 injuries received. The inquest, after evi-
 dence had been taken, was adjourned till
 Tuesday next for the attendance of the
 Factory Inspector of the Ministry of Indus-
 try and Commerce.
