THE LATE REV. FATHER J. CLEERE, C.S.S.R.

The remains of the late Rev. James Cleere, C.S.S.R., of Clonard Monastery, Belfast, who died in Cork on Monday, arrived at Limerick on Tuesday evening at 6.30, and were received at the railway station by the Rector of Mount St. Alphonsus, the Very Rev. Father Deeny, and other members of the Redemptorist Community, as well as numerous members of the Archconfraternity, by whom the deceased clergyman was held in affection and esteem, he having been at one time on the mission here for a period of three years. The remains, which were conveyed to the church, were accompanied from Cork by the Rev. Father Cleary, C.S.S.R., and Rev. Father Whelan, C.S.S.R.

Requiem High Mass was celebrated yesterday morning at 11 o'clock, at which the Bishop, the Most Rev. Dr. Keane, presided.

The Most Rev. Dr. Collier, Bishop of Ossory, assisted at the obsequies.

The celebrant was Very Rev J. Brady, Rector of Clonard, Belfast; deacon, Rev. Father Whelan, C.S.S.R; sub-deacon, Rev. Father O'Toomey, C.S.S.R; master of ceremonies, Rev. Father Brazill, C.C, St John's. Chanters—Rev. Father Harty, C.C, St Michael's, and Rev. Dr. Cowper, C.C, do. There was a large number of clergy in the choir, and a big attendance of the laity.

The chief mourners were—W. Cleere (brother), Sister Scholastica and Miss A. Cleere (sisters), William, Eddie, and Gerard Cleere (nephews), Mrs W. Cleere (sister-in-law), Rev Father Rice, Kilkenny (cousin).

The laity included the Mayor of Limerick (who represented President Cosgrave, a friend of the late Father Cleere), and Mr R. Healy and Mr R. Nolan, solicitors, Kilkenny.

After the Requiem Mass the remains were interred in the crypt beneath the High Altar.

At the Arch-Confraternity meeting on Tuesday night the Spiritual Director, Rev. Father M. Day, referred in touching terms to the death of Father Cleere, who, he mentioned, conducted a Retreat for the Confraternity two years ago. He asked them to remember him in their prayers.
