The death has taken place in Limerick of Mr Cornelius Hogan, the well-known ex-rugby footballer, at the age of forty years, following an illness of considerable duration. The deceased was a junior player for Richmond Club, and afterwards joined Garryowen. He captained the team when at the zenith of its fame, playing in the three-quarter line with the brothers Jack and Thade O'Connor, who had a high opinion of his abilities. He was the recipient of three Munster Cup medals, and represented Munster in several of the inter-provincial trial matches. He was a fine type of player, and excelled as a goal kicker.
