The motion, which is bound to excite a lively discussion, calls on the Corporation to ask the Minister for Local Government to appoint a person to discharge the functions of the Board until the schemes of reorganisation at the City Home and Hospital are completed. These schemes were initiated by the late Commissioner, Mr J. P. Geraghty, but were not finished at the time that the Council by a majority vote decided to terminate the services of the Commissioner.

CHRISTIAN BROTHER DEAD. Native of Limerick.

The death has taken place at St. Joseph's Sanatorium, Baldoyle, of Brother Joseph Bonaventure Cusack, in the 88th year of his age and the 67th of his religious profession. The late Brother Bonaventure was born in the City of Limerick in 1844. At the age of 21 he entered the Christian Brothers' Order. He spent many of his early years in religion in Gibraltar and Bristol, and later was for a long period at the Carriglee Industrial School. In July of the present year, owing to failing health, he entered the Christian Brothers' Sanatorium at Baldoyle.
