**DEATH OF WIFE OF REV.  
 F. MORAN.**

We regret to record the death of Mrs Moran, wife the Rev. Francis Moran, M. A., Methodist minister, who spent seven years in Adare, where she was beloved by all who knew her. The sad event took place at Ballyshannon, Manse, Co. Donegal, after a brief illness, and her only daughter, who was returning to India to join her husband, a British officer, having been apprised of her mother's illness, was enabled to return to Ballyshannon the evening before she died. The funeral took place last Sunday, there being a large and representative attendance of mourners, and the officiating clergy were the Revs. W. P. Moran, B. A., and Wm. Jackson. After the service in the Methodist Church the remains were interred in Mullinashea Churchyard. Protestants and Catholics bore the coffin to the grave.
