THE LATE MR JAMES QUIN.

POSSESSION OF SHANHON FISHERIES.

Payment of Rates Order.

Dublin, Wednesday—Before Mr Justice Hanna, in an action, in which the Commissioners of Public Works were the plaintiffs, and Anthony Mackey, Castleconnell, Co. Limerick, was the defendant, the plaintiffs sought possession of eel fisheries at Castleconnell, Killaloe, Meelick, and Athlone, and also sued for mesne rates. The fisheries were let to the defendant in 1906, and his lease expired in 1926. He remained on as a yearly tenant until 1930, when his tenancy was terminated by a notice to quit.

For the defence it was argued that the notice to quit was bad, and that as the property was vested in the State the Commissioners had no power to sue.

His Lordship gave judgment for the plaintiffs, holding that the notice to quit was good and the Commissioners were the proper persons to sue according to the statutes and the Constitution. He made an order for the payment of rates at the rate of £1,200 a year from 1st February, 1930.
