Finished cattle were in good demand, and quotations generally were above those that obtained at the Xmas fair. This especially applied to young stock, which were in strong demand. Three years old bullocks and heifers made from £16 10s to £18 10s apiece ; two years old, £12 to £14, and yearlings from £8 to £10, according to condition, a few fancy lots realizing eleven guineas. Best beef fetched 38s per cwt, and milch cows £22 ahead.

Wednesday, January 27th :—Shorter supply, class on sale hardly up to last week, though a fairly useful description ; free sale for beef at full values, handy weights found ready purchasers, fresh young cows cashed, half finished lots not in favour. Useful lots of forward cattle and feeders changed hands and wanted, the plainer run of thin stores tedious. For the right stamp prices up to previous level ; vendors willing to take current values got well out. Dairy heifers and yearling heifers met keen demand, top rates. A steady tone reflected in operations, but hardly as ready or quick as last week, generally full previous terms had to be paid. Improved prices and position maintained. Full seasonable turnover, and fair sell up. Three-year-old heifers, £15 10s—£19 ; bullocks, £16 10s ; fat cows, £8 10s—£15 15s ; 2-year-old heifers, £9 15s—£13 ; bullocks, £9 4s—£11 6s ; yearling heifer, £8 15s—£7 5s ; bullocks, £5 6s—£7 1s. Dairy sections, incalf heifers, £17 5s ; aged cows, £15. Sheep—271 penned, best sheep easy to sell at top rates, average class current prices, pens short of condition hard to negotiate, nice hoggets freely bid for, rough sorts not wanted.
