### ESTATE OF THE LATE BISHOP HENN.

The Rt. Rev. Dr. Henry Henn, D.D., of  
Reedley Lodge, Burnley, Lancs., Bishop  
Suffragan of Burnley since 1909, and Rural  
Dean of Burnley since 1912, formerly Vicar  
of St. Paul, Preston, Lancs., and of Bolton  
le Moors, Lancs., and some time Canon of  
Manchester Cathedral, formerly Dean of  
Trinity Hall, Cambridge, and Lecturer in  
Divinity there, and a well-known all-round  
sportsman, who died on October 21st last,  
aged 73 years, son of the late Thomas Rice  
Henn, K.C., D.L., J.P., a former County  
Court Judge for County Galway, Ireland,  
left unsettled property of the gross value of  
£12,427 2s 4d, with net personalty  
£12,057 8s 11d. Probate of his will dated  
January 7th, 1918, has been granted to his
