## DEATH OF MR JAMES F. KILLEEN.

We regret to record the death of a highly esteemed citizen, Mr James F. Killeen, who passed away at his residence, Canal House, Limerick, on Thursday, after an illness of some duration. He was a man of a most kindly and unassuming disposition, and for very many years past occupied an important position in Limerick under the Board of Works, and was a most courteous and capable official. In social life he was very popular, and was an old member of the Shannon Rowing Club. He was brother of the late Mr Andrew Killeen, Assistant Town Clerk of Limerick, and father-in-law of Mr Joseph McCarthy, of the well-known Limerick furniture emporium. His death has been heard of with the keenest regret not only in Limerick, but far outside it, for he had numerous and very appreciative friends in many parts of the country. To the bereaved widow, relatives, and friends, we extend our very sincere sympathy in their sorrow.

The funeral took place to-day after Requiem Mass in St. John's Cathedral for Mount St. Laurence Cemetery, and the attendance was large and representative.
