E.S.B. PROSECUTION.

Case at District Court.

At the City District Court yesterday, before Mr Flood, Stanley W. Martin, Lower Cecil street, was prosecuted by the Electricity Supply Board for having in effect, caused to be wasted and diverted consumed and used a quantity of electricity, the property of the Board.

Mr D. O'Malley, solicitor, appeared for the prosecution, and Mr. J. S. MacNeice, soliciter, for the defence.

Thomas McLean, an official of the Board, said he was instructed to visit the premises of Mr Martin on the 21st December, 1931, and to disconnect the electricity supply. He did so and sealed the meter. On the 22nd January he again visited the defendant's premises to inspect the meter. and found the seal had been broken and 42 units used.

Defendant said he owed an account to the E.S.B. He was from home on the night in question, and when he returned he was informed that a person had been thereand disconnected the meter. He was certain there was no seal on the meter. He had no intention of defrauding the E.S.B.

Mr Flood said the money of the country had been invested in the Shannon Scheme, and it was only right that everyone should pay the charges legally imposed on them, and not place a further burden on the tax-He withheld his decision for a week to give the defendant an opportunity of paying the cost of the electricity used by him, and also the costs of the prosecution.

TRADES DISPUTE ACT.

At the City District Court yesterday, James Norris, a member of a Trades Union, was pro-ecuted for an alleged offence under the Trades Disputes Act.

· Superintendent Stack prosecuted, and Mr J. S. Gaffney, solr., defended. Mr D O'Donovan, solr., held a watching brief on behalf of Mr J. Ryan, butcher, Bridge street.

Francis Kiely said he was employed by Mr J. Ryan, butcher, Bridge street, where there had been a trade dispute, and on several occasions he was followed by the defendant.

In reply to Mr Gaffney, the witness said that only on one occasion was the defendant Norris never assaulted nor close to him. said anything to him.

Guard Darcy said that on one occasion he warned defendant that he was doing an illegal act, but Norris said he did not think
