## IMPORTANT IRISH INDUSTRY

The egg and poultry industry is a very important one for the Saorstát, and it is pleasing to find that in recent years it has developed with satisfactory results. In carrying on the country's export trade, the value of our egg exports for 1929 was over 5 millions sterling, which showed an increase of nearly one hundred thousand pounds on the previous year. The Agricultural Produce (Eggs) Act, which was passed by the Free State Government in 1924, has had a great impetus to Irish trade across the Channel, as it provides for the grading, marking, and packing of eggs, and a strict inspection of this produce throughout the country by the Department's inspectors. This is to the good, and the industry, which is common to cottiers and farmers, has now developed a settled trade and demand, both in the home market and in the export market, with beneficial financial results to the producers. Proof of this is amply furnished in the annual report of the County Kerry Poultry Keepers' Association, presented at the meeting held last Saturday. It is shown that the number of eggs marketed by the 82 branches of the Association totalled 234,170 great hundreds, of which 90 per cent. were sold in the home market, the remaining being exported. The approximate amount of poultry food purchased from the Association contractors by
