FATAL STREET ACCIDENT.

Little Boy Killed.

The Inquest.

Mr J. S. MacNeice, City Coroner, and a jury, held an inquest at Barrington's Hospital yesterday afternoon touching the circumstances of the death of Denis Vereker, aged five years, who, whilst playing at Lock Quay on Thursday evening was knocked down by a motor lorry alleged to have been driven by John O'Brien, Corbally, Portroe, Nenagh, and fatally injured.

Inspector Ryan, William street Barracks, Limerick, conducted the inquiry, and Mr J. D. Ryan, solr., appeared for John O'Brien.

Christopher Vereker, 37 Nicholas street, a mill worker, stated that he was father of the deceased boy, who resided with his grandmother at Bourke's lane, off Clare street.

Dr. T. J. Morris, Resident Medical Officer, Barrington's Hospital, stated that the deceased was admitted to the institution about 4.25 o'clock on the previous evening, and was then dead. Death, in his opinion, was due to shock following hæmorrhage and laceration of the brain.

The Coroner said that was the only evidence that day he wished to be given, as he had to adjourn the inquest pending criminal proceedings.

At the District Court, John O'Brien, Corbally, Portroe, Nenagh, was charged with the manslaughter of Denis Vereker, and remanded for a week on bail. Mr J. D. Ryan, solicitor, appeared for accused. Sergeant Higgins gave evidence of arrest. When cautioned, the accused said he did not know he did it.
