## RUGBY FOOTBALL.

### Munster Senior Cup.

### Bohemians v. Dolphin.

The above teams met in the second round of the Munster Senior Cup competition at the Market Field this afternoon in fine weather, but although the pitch was well sprayed by the City Hibernian Brigade prior to the game it was still on the high side. Over half an hour before the kick-off, p.m., the grounds filled rapidly, and when the game started there must have been a crowd close on 7,000 present. This was Bohemians' first time out in the competition this season, but Dolphin had already defeated Rookwell College a re-play after a previously drawn game.

Bohs. led off against the incline, and Dolphin were penalised for a scrum infringement, and O'Malley's kick improved the home position to Cork 25. The referee early called the forwards together and spoke to them. Dolphin by a series of short forward rushes brought play to within ten yards of Bohs' lines, but Shee cleared to touch at the 25. Then Iggo booted ahead, and McNamara was in difficulties, but managed to save in a dangerous position on the Limerick side. Here Dolphin tried a passing movement, but the Bohemian forwards broke in the opposing backs, and the movement broke down. C. Riordan was dangerous, but Sean O'Sullivan nipped in to save. Walsh brought much needed relief with a big punt to half way, and Hanrahan continued the movement with a good dribble to Cork 25. Dolphin were penalised, and Walsh essayed a penalty kick, which went wide.

A Dolphin forward rush led by May was stemmed by O'Malley, and the Cork backs again got moving at half, but Riordan's pass was astray, and Mangan led his forwards to the Limerick 25. So far Dolphin had more of the ball, but the handling of their backs left much to be desired.

A great Limerick forward rush, led by Riordan and Barry, transferred play some 25 yards to Cork territory. Here Deacon, Dunlea, and Heffernan handled; the latter kicking to touch at half way. Here Hanlon, Bohs., was injured and had to retire. From subsequent scrum King broke away but an in-pass was adjudged forward. Bohs. scrum half kicked nicely to inside Dolphin 25, and Shee was almost over from a loose dribble, but Riordan going down to save. A free to Dolphin brought them relief; Mangan further improved their position with a dribble. A round of pass saw Iggo kicking well down to the Limerick side.

Here Hanlon returned to the game. So there was little outstanding in the play. King marked from a kick ahead by O'Malley, and fouled a good touch of 30 yards. Bohs. were again penalised, and Hanrahan's kick was well replied by McNamara, the Bohemian full. A passing movement by Dolphin backs terminated when Iggo tried a drop at goal, but McNamara sent up the field. Riordan handed off M. Graham, but was put into to ten yards from the Limerick line, when half-time was whistled without score to either side.

Just before the close Dolphin got possession and Dennehy (out-half) broke through cleverly to score. Hanrahan failed to goal.

An exciting finish saw Bohs. attacking, Walsh almost scored between two Dolphin players, but a scrum was ordered. Result—
