The death, which we announce with regret, took place at the Convent of Mercy, Macroom, last Saturday of Sister Mary Lelia (Peel), of the Order of Mercy, in the 38th year of her religious profession. She was a member of an old Limerick family, and was a sister of Dr Peter Peel, of Chicago; Mr Joseph Peel, Liverpool, and Mrs F. Beale, of Carlow. Sister Mary Lelia was formerly connected with the Presentation Convent, Sexton street, Limerick, and was one of the most widely known members of the Community in Macroom. An extremely large number of mourners were present at the obsequies on Monday. The Requiem Mass was sung in the Parish Church, the Very Rev Canon Barrett, P.P., V.F., presiding at the ceremonies.
