CITY FATALITY.

Quarry Worker Killed.

A distressing fatal accident occurred at Rosbrien quarry last evening, the victim being Patrick O'Donnell, aged 29 years, a married man with a wife and five children. He was engaged at the time in excavating at the face of the quarry, when he was caught by a fall of stone and earth before he had time to get clear. Spiritual and medical assistance was promptly forthcoming, and when the unfortunate man was extricated life was almost extinct. The medical examination showed that both legs were fractured, and he received in addition external injuries. The body was removed in the fire station ambulance to Barrington's Hospital pending an inquest.

An inquest was opened at Barrington's Hospital this evening by Dr. M. R. Clery, County Coroner and a jury, into the circumstances under which the deceased was killed.

Inspector Lyons, assisted by Sergeant Ruane, conducted the enquiry; Mr N. Gaffney, solicitor, appeared for the next-of-kin, and Mr A. Blood-Smyth, solicitor, for the owner of the quarry.

Evidence of identification having been given, the medical testimony was tendered by Dr T. A. Morris, House Surgeon, Barrington's Hospital, who stated that life was extinct when the man reached the hospital. He had fracture of both legs and internal injuries. Death was due to shock and hemorrhage as the result of these injuries.

The enquiry was adjourned for the attendance of a representative of the Ministry of Industry and Commerce.
