Hay Burning.

Insurance Claim Rejected.

Judge McElligott heard an application by Lawrence Tobin, Ballyfuskeen, for £144 compensation for the burning of thirty-six tons of hay in January last.

Since the applicant stated that the hay was situated thirty yards from the house and about one hundred and twenty yards from the nearest dwellinghouse, the insurance company was at the back of the house and a considerable quantity of hay was burnt. On Jan. he left home at 5.45 p.m. and returned at 11.45, to find that his hay was on fire. At 11.45 he left home his four children in the house.

On examination, the applicant stated that he had received £310 from an insurance
