DEATH OF REV. FATHER VASSALL-PHILLIPS, C.S.S.R.

The death of the Rev. Father Vassall-Phillips, C.S.S.R., which is announced today, will be learned with sincere regret in Limerick, where he ministered about forty years ago. He was for some time Rector at Mount St. Alphonsus, and a Spiritual Director of the Arch-Confraternity, in which he took a deep interest. Father Vassall-Phillips was ordained in 1884, and in addition to being a great missionary he found time during his busy ministerial career to write a number of devotional and other works. During the war he served as a chaplain to the forces.

WILL OF MAJOR P. J. WALDRON.
