LIMERICK FATALITY.

One Killed.

A tragic accident, with a fatal result, occurred near Limerick on Sunday evening. William Shanahan, aged 27, was killed outright at Singland while motor cycling with his brother Lawrence, who sustained injuries stated not to be serious. It appears that deceased who was driving the machine, They were had Lawrence as pillion rider. returning to their home at 15 Sandwith Place, Dublin, at half past seven, after paying a visit to their sister, who is married to a soldier stationed in Sarsfield Barracks. Nearing the Groody bridge they came into collision with a Dundalk lorry driven by James Wallace, and in the impact William received injuries which resulted in instantaneous death. The body was removed in the Fire Station ambulance to the County Infirmary, and Lawrence was taken to Barrington's Hospital, where he is detained. The deceased, who was an employe of the Alliance and Dublin Gas Company, leaves a wife and two young children to mourn his tragic end.

Inquest Opened.

An inquest was opened at the County Infirmary last evening by Dr. M. R. Clery, Coroner East Limerick, and a jury, of which Mr James McDonagh was foreman, into the circumstan es under which deceased lost his

Inspector Ryan conducted the enquiry, and Mr A. Blood-Smyth, solicitor, appeared

for the driver of the lorry.

Dr. J. McPolin stated he was travelling in his motor car at 6.30 on Sunday evening from Limerick, and at a point about a mile from the city boundary, on the Limerick-Dublin road, he observed a stationary lorry.' A mot r cycle was lying in front of the lorry, and a man who was stret-hed alongside was bleeding profusely from the head, mouth and nose, with a woman supporting his head. Witness stopped his car, and on examining the man found a large wound in the right side of his head—frontal region. Blood was pouring from the wound, and a further examination showed fracture of the skull. Pressure on the scalp stopped some of the bleeding, but blo d continued to pour from the mouth, nose and ears. The right leg was fractured, and the man died in about five minutes from the time he arrived on the scene. Death was due to shock and hemorrhage as a result of compound fracture of the skull and laceration of the brain.

Mrs Elizabeth Askin Sarsfield Barracks, city, sister, identified the remains. She said her brother was 27 years of age and married. She last saw him alive at 8:45 on Sunday when he left her home with his brother Lawrence, after spending the weekend with her. They were riding a motor cycle, Lawrence being on the pillion.

Inspector Ryan, at this stage, applied for an adjournment, as the driver of the lorry was charged with manslaughter, and in addition Lawrence Shanahan, an essential witness, was still in hospital, and could not

The Coroner said as the evidence was inconclusive he would have to adjourn the inquest sine die.

The foreman and jury tendered sincere sympathy to the family of the deceased, in which the Coroner and Inspector Ryan
