**FATAL ROAD COLLISION**

**In Co. Limerick.**

Dr. P. J. Cleary, Coroner for East  
Limerick, held an inquest last evening at  
the County Hospital, Croom, inquiring into  
the circumstances of the death of John  
Horgan, who died at the Institution at 5  
o'clock that morning.

Inspector Lyons represented the Garda  
authorities, and a watching brief on behalf  
of Major Clarke, who was charged with the  
manslaughter of deceased, was held by Mr  
A. Blood-Smyth, Solicitor, Limerick.

Evidence of identification was given by  
William Horgan, N.T., Brosna, Co. Kerry  
(cousin), who stated deceased was employed  
as foreman by the Board of Works, and he  
last knew him to be located at Bruff in  
connection with the Morning Star Drainage  
Scheme. Deceased was aged about 34  
years, and was unmarried.

Sergeant W. Nolan, Bruree, gave evidence  
of receiving a report of a motor collision at  
Ballyfookeen, otherwise known as Rourke's  
Cross, on the 24th inst., at about 6.15 p.m.  
On arrival at the scene he found a man  
lying on the grass margin close to the cross.  
He was bleeding from the ears, and was  
subsequently removed in an ambulance to  
the County Hospital, Croom. On searching  
him witness found a driver's licence bearing  
the name John Horgan, Brosna, Co. Kerry.  
He identified that man as deceased.

In reply to the Coroner, witness stated  
that deceased prior to the collision was  
riding a motor cycle from the direction of  
Bruree towards Newcastle West. The motor  
car which was involved in the accident was  
coming from the Cork direction towards  
Limerick.

Inspector Lyons, Bruff, intimated that  
proceedings were being taken in another  
court against the driver of the car, Major  
Clarke, Kildimo, who was charged that  
afternoon before a Peace Commissioners with  
the manslaughter of deceased.

Mr Blood-Smyth said that he appeared  
for Major Clarke.

Dr Violet Madden detailed the condition  
of deceased on admission to the County  
Hospital. He was unconscious and bleeding  
freely from the left lung. There were  
several abrasions of the scalp. Paralysis  
had set in and congestion of the lungs.  
Deceased was admitted at about 6.30 p.m.  
on 24th inst. He died at 5 a.m. on 29th  
inst. In witness's opinion death was due to  
shock and hæmorrhage following fracture of  
the base of skull. The injuries would be such  
as would be caused by a fall from a motor  
cycle, or would be such as would be sustained  
in a road collision.

The inquest was accordingly adjourned  
sine die, and in proposing a vote of sympathy  
with the relatives of deceased, the Coroner  
said that it was a very sad case in which a  
young man in the prime of life was cut off  
suddenly.

Mr Blood-Smyth said that there was no  
one who regretted the tragedy more than  
Major Clarke, whom he represented, and on  
his behalf he tendered deepest sympathy to  
the relatives.

The foreman, Mr Carroll, and the mem-  
bers of the jury, expressed their sympathy,  
and Inspector Lyons, on behalf of the  
Garda, also associated himself with the vote.

Immediately afterwards the funeral left  
on its way to Brosna, Co. Kerry.

**PAPAL LEGATE.**

**Visit to Killarney.**

Cardinal Lorenzo Lauri, Papal Legate,  
left Dublin this morning by special train,  
accompanied by the members of his suite  
on a visit to Killarney. His Eminence was  
received at Kingsbridge Station by the  
Right Hon. James McMahon and Mr P. J.  
Brady, Directors of the G.S.R. Co.; Mr H.  
S. Coe, Secretary of the Company, and Mr  
P. J. Floyd, Traffic Manager. Crowds  
waved flags and cheered at every station as  
the train sped by.

**Government Arrangements for  
Legate's Departure.**

A special conference was held at the  
Department of External Affairs to-day to  
plan the arrangements in connection with  
the departure of the Papal Legate, Cardinal  
Lorenzo Lauri, from Dublin on Sunday.  
The conference was attended by officials of  
the Department of External Affairs, the  
Gardai, and the Army.

The Papal Legate will leave Archbishop's  
House at 8.30 a.m. on Sunday, and the  
route to Dun Laoghaire will be the same  
as that by which he reached the city on  
his arrival.

On the arrival of the Papal Legate at  
Dun Laoghaire he will be received by Mr de  
Valera and members of the Government.  
Those awaiting him will include members  
of the Eucharistic Congress Committee and  
the Lord Mayor of Dublin. The Army will  
provide a special guard of honour. There  
will be a salute of nineteen guns. Aero-  
planes will encircle the steamer as the  
vessel leaves the pier for Holyhead.
