

This expenditure has been met by the ratepayers, who will have to meet the interest on the loan, and this has been increased from £100,000 to £150,000 in the pound. That it could not be avoided, and that the service were absolutely necessary, if the Corporation have an adequate water supply of any kind. A plan was outlined by the Corporation, and consists in a scheme, but if the citizens will not consent, it is feared that little good will be done by a mechanical rectification of the pipes. It is well known that the carelessness or indifference of the Corporation in many houses, without the necessary repairs during the day and night, and people were alive to their own interests. The Inspector of the Corporation is responsible for this state of affairs, and it is not to be expected that he will do anything in any two districts at once.
