

DR. MacLAUGHLIN

To Rejoin Electricity Supply Board.

Dr T. A. MacLaughlin will rejoin the Electricity Supply Board as a full-time member at the beginning of August. This announcement, which is not yet official, is the result of negotiations which have been going on for some time past.

There are at present two permanent members on the Board—namely, Mr R. F. Browne (chairman) and Mr J. M. Fay, Technical Director, while there are three part-time members: Dr H. Kennedy, Dr J. C. Foley and Mr P. J. Egan.

It will be recalled that, in consequence of differences of opinion with the late Government, Dr MacLaughlin felt obliged to resign from the Board, and by an Act specially passed in July of last year he was awarded a grant of £2,000.

At the time of his resignation Dr MacLaughlin was managing director of the Board. His position when he returns to the Board will be for the Board itself to decide.
