DEATH OF MR WM. J. HOWELL.

Many old friends in Limerick will regret
to learn of the death of Mr Wm. J. Howell,
who for many years, up to some 31 years
ago, was manager of the "Limerick
Chronicle." We learn from the "Newark
(U.S.A.) Evening News" of July 12, that
he passed away the previous Sunday (10th
inst.) at his residence, 117 Argyle Place,
Arlington, in the 71st year of his age.

"Mr Howell," says the paper, "was a
resident of Arlington thirty-one years. He
was associated with the Arlington Co., and
its successor the du Pont Viscolond Com-
pany until his retirement three years ago.
He leaves his wife, Mrs Frances E. Howell;
a son, William T., of Arlington, and two
daughters. Mrs Harry T. Carr, of Arlington,
and Mrs J. Louis Lablaux, of South
Orange."

Mr Howell, who was a man of a most
kindly and generous disposition, was held in
high esteem and regard by the "Chronicle"
staff, and numerous other friends, and those
of them who remain will sincerely sympa-
tise with his widow and family in their
sorrow.

The interment took place at Christ Church
cemetery, Belleville, Rev. Warren V. H.
