Drowning Tragedy at Lahinch.

Two Limerick Men Lose Their Lives.

A painful sensation was caused in Limerick on Sunday night when it became known that two respected citizens—Thomas Mulcucen, aged 65, St. John's Avenue (married), and Patrick A. Coffey, 35 (single), of Blackboy Pike-were drowned while bathing at Lahinch about five o'clock that evening

It appears that both men, who were good swimmers, were members of an excursion party who arrived from Limerick by train in the afternoon. Along with four or live others they went out for a dip towards the end of the promenade. They were not long in the water when a strong current carried the two men out to sea. Other bathers jucluding Mr Barron (Limerick), and Mr Patrick Morrissey (Ennis), went to their rescue. and Mr Mulqueen was brought ashore where artificial respiration was applied by Dr Barry, Ennistymon, and Dr Daly, Kilrush, but without success. Search was made by the Civic Guards for Mr Coffey's body, but so far it has not been found.

Three other young Limerick men were swimming slightly out of their depth when the alarm was first raised, and two life belts were rushed out from the shore, but lowing to the conditions of the tide they could not reach the drowning men.

The tragic occurrence, needless to say, cast a gloom over I ahinch, where there were numerous excursionists from Limerick, Ennis, and other parts of Clare.

Mr Mulqueen was for a number of years a member of the staff of Mr E. G. Fitt, provision merchant, O'Connell street. In his time he saved some lives from drowning, for which the Humane Society's medal was awarded him, and in addition to being a good swimmmer, he was an all-round sportsman.

Mr Joffey spent several years in the office of Sir Francis Kearney, solicitor, who, when he became Clerk of the Crown and Peace, transferred him to the County Courthduse, and here he had since continued in office under Mr H. OB. Moran, solr., the present County Registrar. Mr Coffey was a man of very kindly disposition, and his untimely end is deplored by a wide circle of friends, whose sympathics go forth to his videwed mother better and sisters.
