DEATH OF REV. W. NOLAN, C.S.S.R.

Rev. Wm. Nolan, C.S.S.R., died at Clonard Monastery, Belfast, on Sunday evening.

Born in Limerick in 1844, he was professed in 1906, and ordained in 1911. He went to Australia in 1913, but his health broke down, and he returned to Ireland in 1916, when he was engaged in missionary work till 1927, when his health again failed.

Father Nolan came to Clonard in December last. He was a brother of Father Louis Nolan, a distinguished member of the Dominican Order, and at present one of the Consultors General of the Order in Rome. Another brother, Mr John Nolan, resides in Limerick.
