## SWEEPSTAKES' FUND.

### of Health Board.

Mr. Quinn, at the meeting of the Council yesterday, proposed that the Minister for Local Government should be informed of the fact that the Board had spent over £31,000 on the Hospital, Croom, and that this should be taken into account in allocating a portion of the Sweepstakes' Fund to the Hospital.

Mr. Quinn also added that for some years a considerable expense was incurred in sending outside the Board considered the best solution was to convert the present block of buildings at Croom into a ward for surgical cases and a maternity ward at the County Hospital, and to enlarge the existing fever hospital, and to increase accommodation for the Hospital.
