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Mr A. Mackey, at the
rd last evening, said the
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EXTENSION OF THE DOCK BASIN, TO BE CONSTRU-
ted with the accrued funds of the Board,
aggregating £80,000. When the Depart-
ment of Industry and Commerce intimated
refusal to guarantee a loan of £100,000 for
a full scheme the Board had no other course
open to them but to proceed with the
project that would fall within the limits of
their financial position. This, when carried
out will relieve congestion in the dock, and
it will be left to posterity to complete the
larger project, which involves the construc-
tion of a western entrance to the basin, and
the provision of new gates.

DEATH OF MR J. DAVERN.

The death took place at his residence,
Davis street, last night, of Mr Jeremiah
Davern, a well-known and respected citizen.
He was a former member of the Corporation
as representative of the Glentworth Ward,
for which he did useful public work. He
took a deep interest in the Town Tenants
movement, and was chairman of the City
branch for a number of years. His death
at a comparatively early age has occasioned
sincere regret in the city, and sympathy is
extended to his widow and family in
their bereavement.

At the meeting of the Corporation Com-
mittees last night a vote of condolence was
passed to his wife and family in their
sorrow.

The remains will be removed to St.
Michael's Church at 8 o'clock this (Thursday
evening), and the funeral will take place at
3.30 to-morrow for Mount St Laurence
cemetery.
