**DIED GOING TO MASS.**

When entering St. Michael's Church for 7 o'clock Mass on Sunday morning, Mrs McCoy (60) collapsed and died suddenly.

The deceased, who lived in Church-street, was hurrying for Mass, as she was going on an excursion to Ballybunion. Approaching the church gate she was seen to collapse. Spiritual aid was immediately forthcoming, and she died in a few minutes. Death having been due to natural causes, the City Coroner did not hold an inquest.

**FATAL SEIZURE.**

John Gaffney, aged 64, married, died suddenly at his residence, No. 1 Lower Harstonge-street, on Sunday. He was apparently in his usual good health in the morning, and some time in the afternoon he had a seizure, which terminated fatally. The deceased was an ex-R.I.C. man, and was at the time of his death in the employment of the Irish Omnibus Co. Death having been certified as due to heart disease, an inquest was not considered necessary.
