FUNERAL OF CANON T. B. ROBERTSON.

The funeral of the late Canon Thomas Boswell Robertson, whose death occurred in Dublin on Saturday morning, took place yesterday in Limerick. At half-past 12 the remains arri ed at St. Munchin's by motor hearse, and were accompanied by the family of the deceased clergyman. At the entrance to the church the remains were received by the Rev. A. E. Hewetson-Jones, Rector, and were borne to the sacred edifice, where a service was held.

There was a large congregation present, and the service, which was very impressive, was conducted by the Lord Bishop, Right Rev. Dr White, the Dean of Limerick, the Archdeacon of Limerick, the Rev Treasurer Abbott, and the Rector. The Dean then read the Lesson, after which an address was delivered by the Archdeacon, in the course of which he spoke of the work of Canon Robertson in the sacred ministry.
