## FUNERAL OF CANON T. B. ROBERTSON.

The funeral of the late Canon Thomas Boswell Robertson, whose death occurred in Dublin on Saturday morning, took place yesterday in Limerick. At half-past 12 the remains arrived at St. Munchin's by motor hearse, and were accompanied by the family of the deceased clergyman. At the entrance to the church the remains were received by the Rev. A. E. Hewetson-Jones, Rector, and were borne to the sacred edifice, where a service was held.

There was a large congregation present, and the service, which was very impressive, was conducted by the Lord Bishop, Right Rev. Dr. White, the Dean of Limerick, the Archdeacon of Limerick, the Rev. Treasurer Abbott, and the Rector. The opening hymn was "We've no Abiding City Here," followed by Psalm 23, "The Lord is my Shepherd." The Dean then read the Lesson, after which an address was delivered by the Archdeacon, in the course of which he spoke of the work of Canon Robertson in the sacred ministry. He referred to his long connection with St. Munchin's, extending over a period of thirty-three years, during which he endeared himself to his brethren in the Ministry, and to his parishioners.

The service concluded with the hymn, "For all the Saints," and prayers by Rev. Treasurer Abbott.

The coffin was borne out to the grave to the strains of the Dead March in Saul.

The Committal prayers were read by the Rector, and the Benediction pronounced by the Bishop.

DOCK EXAMINATION

The Secretary read a letter from the Secretary of the Department of Industry and Commerce.
