The following official statement was issued from Government Buildings, Dublin, yesterday :—

"The Minister for Agriculture met the bacon-curers to-day.

"The Minister outlined a scheme which has been adopted by the Government to help the bacon industry.

"From September 26th a bounty of 10s. per cwt. will be paid on all bacon exported from the Saorstát ;

a bounty of 7s. 6d. per cwt. on pork, and a bounty of 5s. per cwt. on plucks.

"The curers undertook to pass the full benefit of this bounty to the producer.

"The price of pigs from Monday, September 19th, will increase accordingly.

"An increase of 10s. per cwt. on bacon should enable the curer to increase the price for live pigs by 5s. 6d. to 6s. per cwt."
