DEATH OF MR. MICHAEL GOUGH.

The death, which we announce with regret, took place at his residence, Rosbrien House, this morning, after an illness of some duration, of Mr Michael Gough, building contractor. The deceased, who had reached an advanced age, was associated with the building trade of the city all his life, and in that connection was responsible for the erection of several housing schemes, private and public. He carried out in cut limestone a few years ago, an elaborate extension of the Franciscan church, and which stands as a credit to his workmanship. Mr Gough was for many years an active public representative on the Corporation and Harbour Board, where his advice was always valued as being helpful and constructive. He was father of Mr T. Gough, Borough Councillor, and proprietor of the Coliseum Cinema, O'Connell street, with whom and his sister sincere sympathy will be felt in their bereavement.

The late Mr Gough took a deep interest in every movement that had for its object the advancement of his native city, where he was held in the highest respect for his straightforward character and genial disposition.
