attached to a technical training school by the Minister of Education, in an address at the Municipal Institute last night. The Minister, who was in connection with the formal opening of the new extension of the institute, congratulated the Vocational Education Committee and the Minister for the acquisition of the extension, which was erected at an approximate cost of £100,000 under the facilities provided by the Act of 1930. Better opportunities would be afforded for instruction at the school, which has, as Mr Derrig stated, been in high regard by the Department. It was shown last year, when for the first time Limerick was the only centre outside of Dublin for the training of a large group of manual instructors. Recent Motor Accident Near Annacotty

Co. Tipperary Priest

Proceedings at District

Yesterday afternoon, in the house, District Justice Flood, hearing of a case in which the Gunning, C.C., Toomevara, Co. Tipperary, was charged, as alleged, with the slaughter of Cornelius McNamara, aged 19 years, by knocking him out of a motor car at Rivers, Annacotty, on the night of the 14th September. The driver was charged with causing grievous bodily harm to Matthew Rainsford on the same night.

Considerable interest was shown in the proceedings, it being stated that a number of witnesses to be examined for the prosecution and the defence will run in the course of the trial.

Mr K. J. Liston (instructor, Tipperary Power, State Solicitor), appeared for the prosecution, and Mr T. A. Finlay, K.C., and Mr C. F. Casey (instructor, Tipperary Power, solr.), represented the defence.

Mr Liston stated on the night of the 14th September, that he was driving along the main Limerick-Dublin road at Annacotty. They were close together when they were overtaken by an oncoming car. McNamara was driving the car. Rainsford was seriously injured and would be produced to establish that the driver of the car was the accused, Gunning.

Matthew Rainsford, labourer, Lisnagry, stated that on the night of the 14th September, he went to Castleconnell for a day's cycling, and on the return journey he was delayed at Sallymount Cross, Co. Tipperary, and proceeded to Annacotty, taking about 10.30 p.m. Witness, proceeding, stated that at the house he met Philip and James McNamara, brothers. He was driving on the main road in the direction of Limerick with the McNamara car. He turned off the main road at Rivers, and met a girl named Crissie, whom they conversed for some time before leaving the girl witness residing at Annacotty. Both having got to the main road, proceeded in the direction of Annacotty, walking on the main road, the witness being near to the car. They had gone five or six
