COMPREHENSIVE HOUSING SCHEME.

The Local Government Department has written to the Town Clerk approving of the lay-out plan for the erection of houses on the Island Field. The Corporation, under this scheme, propose building three hundred houses on this site at a rental that will be within the province of the workers to pay. Should the scheme materialise it will be the largest ever undertaken by the Corporation.

DEATH OF REV. W. H. BROWN.

We regret to announce the death, which took place yesterday in Dublin, of the Rev. William H. Brown, B.A., T.C.D., Rector of Tulla, Co. Clute. Graduating from Dublin University in 1899 he was ordained three years later for the Diocese of Limerick. He passed from the curacy of St. Michael's, Limerick, in 1904 to that of Quin, of which he became Incumbent in 1909. He was Rector of Tulla from 1926 until his death.

The funeral, which was private, took place this morning to Dean's Grange Cemetery.

Report for Last Season

The following is the report in relation to the Limerick Municipal dinners for the season 1931-'32:—

Owing to an increase of unemployment which caused a good deal of poverty, the Municipal dinners re-opened earlier than usual—October 1. The number of dinners served during the season was 19,063, and the number of teas 4,400. These figures show a big increase on the year's; the number being 17,000 dinners, and 4,400 teas.
