LABOURERS' COTTAGE PURCHASE SCHEME.

The question of the purchase by the labourers of labourers' cottages in the county Limerick has for some time engaged the attention of the County Council, and in view of the fact that a Commission is at present taking evidence on the subject in Dublin, the report presented to the County Council at its meeting last Saturday comes up at an opportune time. The tenants of cottages are a very deserving class. As a rule their houses are very neatly kept, and the labourers and their families make the most of the plots adjoining for the production of fruit and vegetables. Thus, a very desirable feature of rural industry is maintained, and considering that the output of home-grown products, such as these, is not equal to the demands of the consumer in the cities and towns; there is no doubt the cottier deserves every encouragement and support. The security of tenure is a desideratum that appeals to everyone. It has long been established on the land, it is growing in the urban areas, and it is only natural to expect

SAD CYCLING FATALITY.

At Mungret

National School Teacher's Death.

Mr. Patrick J. Larkin, Principal of the Mungret National School, succumbed in the County Infirmery yesterday to injuries received in collision with a motor car at Mungret Cross last Friday. The deceased was cycling home after school hours, and when crossing into a bye road in which he lived, he collided with the car, which promptly pulled up, and had him removed to the Infirmery. The driver also notified the Civic Guards of the occurrence.

Mr Larkin sustained serious injuries, and passed away, as stated, yesterday. The deceased, who was a native of County Clare, leaves a widow and two children to mourn his loss.

Inquest Opened.

An inquest was held at the County Infirmery last evening by Mr J. S. McNeice, solr., Deputy Coroner, into the circumstances connected with death.

Superintendent Crean, Groom, conducted the enquiry; Mr D. J. O'Malley, solr., appeared for the next-of-kin, and Mr P. G. Collins, solr., for the driver of the motor car, John Kelly, Shannon Street, City.

Evidence of identification was given by Mrs M. Larkin, widow of the deceased, who, she said, was 50 years of age, and principal of Mungret National School.

Dr A. Murnane, House Surgeon at the County Infirmery, stated that deceased was admitted to the institution at 5.15 p.m. on Friday. He was then semi-conscious, and an examination revealed that he was suffering from a dislocation of the outer right collar bone, while the second and third ribs were fractured, and facial contusions. In conjunction with Dr Corboy she held a post mortem examination, which showed there was bruising of the front chest and penetration of the right lung by fragments of the ribs. Death was due to shock and hæmorrhage as the result of these injuries.

Dr Corboy corroborated. The Deputy Coroner adjourned the inquiry pending criminal proceedings against the driver of the car, who was charged during the day at a special court at Groom, and remanded on bail on a charge of manslaughter.

The Coroner tendered his sympathy to the widow and family of the deceased, and Superintendent Crean, Mr O'Malley, and Mr Collins associated themselves with the expression of sympathy.

Bi-Centenary Celebration Limerick

The celebrations in connection with the Bi-centenary of the Foundation of the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer were brought to a close in the city of St. Alphonsus on Sunday night. The ceremonies, which commenced on Tuesday night, were purely religious, it being considered not advisable to have any secular celebrations having regard to the conditions of the times.

There were, rosary, sermon, and Benediction on Thursday and Friday night at 8 o'clock, at which large congregations attended, the preacher being the Rev. Fr. Nicholson, C.S.S.R., of the English Province, who was attached to the Convent of Mount St. Alphonsus thirty years ago.

At 12 o'clock on Sunday Solemn Mass was sung, at which the Bishop of Limerick, Rev. Dr. Keane, in full canonicals, presided. The celebrant was Very Rev. Fr. F. J. C.S.S.R., Provincial; deacon, Rev. Fr. Murray, C.S.S.R.; sub-deacon, Rev. Fr. Murphy, C.S.S.R.; and Masters of Ceremonies, Rev. Fr. Brassill, C.C., and Rev. Fr. Griffin, C.S.S.R.

Father Nicholson was the preacher, and the sacred music was beautifully rendered by the choir under the direction of Van de Velde, organist.

On Sunday evening at 7 o'clock the church edifice was crowded long before the solemnities commenced. After the Benediction of the Sacrament, at which the Bishop of Limerick followed, his Lordship being assisted by Very Rev. Father Fitzgerald, Provincial, and Very Rev. Father C.S.S.R., Rector.

At the conclusion of the Mass of the Most Holy Redeemer, the Brass and Band played a selection of hymns on the steps of the monastery in honour of the occasion. At night the exterior of the church and the tower were illuminated with colour.
