**DEATH OF A CORK JOURNALIST.**

We regret to record the death of Mr W. N. O'Herlihy, Chief Reporter of the "Cork Examiner," which occurred in the Bon Secours Home on Sunday morning. Mr O'Herlihy, who was aged about 55, was born near Newcastle West, Co. Limerick. He was a brilliant journalist, and apart from his professional duties found time during his busy career, which was all spent in Cork, to identify himself with various phases of civic life. He was private secretary to the late Sir Edward Fitzgerald in connection with the Cork Exhibition of 1902. He was also associated with the cause of charity, being a prominent member of the St Vincent De Paul and Sick Poor Societies. One of Mr O'Herlihy's most recent activities was an investigation into the cause and cure of canker and other diseases in trees. This subject he studied deeply, and in conjunction with another Corkman he discovered a treatment, which, under practical test, yielded very remarkable results. He had been seriously ill for a month or so. His premature demise is deeply regretted, and sincere sympathy is expressed with his bereaved widow and family.
